CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 am by Chair, McCleary.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The minutes of the Spring I 2018 meeting were approved as is. Communi moved and Wilson seconded to approve the minutes. All approved (7-0).

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Because of the tight schedule and the need to complete all the time sensitive certain items, time ran out and announcement were not made. Announcements scheduled for this meeting will be added to the Fall I 2018 Meeting.

OLD BUSINESS

Because of the tight schedule and the need to complete all the time certain items, Old Business was not discussed. Old Business scheduled for this meeting will be added to the Fall I 2018 Meeting.

NEW BUSINESS (Time Certain)

Ed.D. Program, Discussion on Change of HSIRB Structure: Amanda Taggart, Brian Street, Elaine Correa, & Mahmoud Suleiman.

After introductions, the Coordinator of the Ed.D. program, Taggart, provided an overview of the Ed.D. program noting that it is now a stand-alone program completely separate from Fresno State. Taggert voiced her concerns regarding the CSUB IRB and how it has impacted the program. She brought up two issues, 1) Classroom projects, and 2) Dissertations. She stated that there were issues with the IRB response times based on classroom projects that were submitted to the IRB. Although dissertations have not been submitted to the IRB, she voiced her concerns that response times of the IRB would put their students at risk for not completing their projects. She then passed out handouts showing the process that Fresno State uses asking the board to consider using their model. She stated that Fresno State's IRB does not review classroom projects and uses a different system and asked the board to consider changing its structure. She then stated that students were not able to complete their classroom projects because of the IRB. She further stated that these students were still awaiting responses from the IRB.

Sumaya first made it clear that the IRB's response times are very quick as compared to national averages. Further, Sumaya provided insight from the perspective of the IRB stating that, 1) the classroom projects in question were submitted November 8th-13th, much too late in the semester to ensure enough time for review and approval, not to mention, to carry-out their projects, by the end of the semester, 2) although late in the game, she began the review process only to find that the protocols were written so poorly that it was difficult to determine what type of review they would undergo. She stated that she began to work with the student groups providing feedback but some of the groups did not respond back to her comments and that by the time the IRB heard back from some of the groups the semester was over. Sumaya then stated that she cc'd the course instructor, the faculty sponsor on all the classroom projects, on all the correspondence so that he knew what was going on and did not get a response from him. Lastly, Sumaya let the board know that the statement that Taggart made about the IRB not responding to this day was not accurate and that she had documentation in hand to support her statement. Taggart disagreed stating that she had evidence supporting her claim that the IRB had not responded but did not want to produce it. From her perspective, Sumaya made it clear that the reason the protocols did not get approved was not the fault of the IRB but was the fault of the late submissions and the poorly written protocols. Chair McCleary then added that the faculty sponsors are the key to ensuring a quick approval and that it is their job to review and vet protocols and that she sees these issues as a matter of students needing more mentorship. All agreed. Correa asked if review comments could be cc'd to the faculty advisor as well as the Program Director. Sumaya let her know that the Faculty Sponsor is always cc'd on any IRB correspondence and that she does not cc Directors of programs. She said that she could easily do this. Board member Wilson commented that it might be a good idea to have an assignment in a course that would require students to write a mock protocol to learn how to do so before submitting their first official protocol to the IRB. Street noted that he could do a better job of covering the IRB process in his research method courses. Another board member stated that it would be a good idea for the IRB to assist in educating the students and reviewing protocols. Sumaya noted that she has already begun to do so by recently presenting a workshop to the students in the program on the elements of a good protocol. More conversation took place and the consensus was that a task force needed to be put in place between the IRB and the Ed.D. program that would provide guidelines.

Reviewer Feedback on Expedited Reviews – Protocol 18-34 Higa [Attachment B]. NEW PROTOCOL REVIEWS [6]

After introductions, investigators provided a brief summary of their protocols. Discussions then took place between the PI and the board allowing the board to raise concerns and the PI to address those concerns. Below are summaries of the discussions and the outcomes of the reviews.

Protocol 18-50 [Li], "Acculturation and Mental Health Among Asian Older Adults: An Ecological System Perspective." Primary Readers: Wilson & Gamboa

The PI discussed that he wanted to make substantial changes to his protocol including reducing the amount of variables measured, changing the scales used, and changing the focus of the study.

Consequently, the board could not approve the protocol. The board requested Li to resubmit a new protocol with all the changes that he discussed. The board also requested that in his resubmission to:

- use less social work jargon in the consent form making it more understandable to participants
- make clear how he will deal with assuring that participants have the capacity to give consent to participate
- include consent forms and surveys in all the appropriate languages
- more fully define what his incentives will be
- more fully define who will administer surveys and informed consent
- include all personnel that will assist in data collection along with human subjects certification

The board then went into executive session deciding that as is the protocol could not be approved but upon resubmission, the protocol would be re-reviewed by the two primary reviewers over the summer.

Protocol 18-61 [Evans-Santiago CO-PIs: Beck, Hays], "University-District Bridged Mentorship Practice Utilizing Youth Participatory Action Research to Reduce the Discipline Disparities for Students of Color." Primary Readers: Herndon & Commuri

One PI, Evans-Santiago, attended the meeting by phone, and Hays was present. The discussion began with the fact that the investigators did not include in the submission enough information about data collection and did not include survey instruments.

Consequently, the board could not approve the protocol. The board requested Evans-Santiago to resubmit a new revised protocol with the focus on data collection. The board requested, at minimum, the resubmission to include:

- A revised protocol focusing on the collection of data as opposed to the mentor program that the school is implementing that the project plans to assess
- a letter from the superintendent providing approval for data collection at the school
- details such as who will collect the data, who will provide informed consent
- the need for a Spanish version of consent forms and assent forms
- details of the structured interviews
- Also, a 3rd Party Access Protocol might need to be submitted if secondary data will be collected at the school district

The board then went into executive session deciding that as is the protocol could not be approved but upon resubmission, the protocol would be re-reviewed by the two primary reviewers over the summer.

Protocol 18-54 [Harris, Duran], "Consent Project Survey." Primary Readers: Communi & McCleary

There was major reservation on the part of the board to approve this protocol based on the topic, sexual assault, and the explicit questions that were proposed to be asked. There were also issues with the method of data collection. After much Q&A, the board requested that the following revision be made to assure for the safety and protection of the participants. The conditions for approval were:

- Change method of data collection from online to in person
- In person data collection needs to take place in a room with computers so that the participants can take the survey online on a computer.
- Have certified and trained personnel from the Alliance in the data collection

- room who will administer informed consent and provide information on mental health resources.
- Revise purpose and title to reflect what is mainly being measured, sexual assault
- Revise informed consent accordingly so that the participants clearly understand that they will be asked explicit questions about sexual assault
- Include a follow-up email providing mental health resources after participation
- Confirm with CSUB Counsel, Claudia Catota, that research personal are not considered mandatory reporters including this information in the protocol

The board then went into executive session whereby McCleary moved to approve the protocol with conditions being met, Olson seconded (6-1), with Community voting not to approve.

Protocol 18-56 Hwang, Morano, "Bring STREAM Education on Stream." Primary Readers: Olson & Livingston

At the meeting the board could not make a determination on this standard review because the submission did not include survey instruments to use to measure attitudes of instructor participants and the student participants. The board asked the PIs to resubmit a new revised protocol including those survey instruments in order to re-review the protocol. Also, during the meeting the board did have other concerns requesting that these concerns be addressed in the revision. They are below:

- Specify in the protocol who will collect survey data
- Include in the consent form that students will still have access to services if they choose not to participate
- Use plain language in the parent consent form adding that they can withdraw their children at any time without penalty
- State in the protocol and consent form that the STREAM education is for all students regardless of participation
- Add a consent form for the teachers
- Add a detailed plan for information security (i.e., data locked in a secure cabinet, computer password protected)
- Submit a 3^{rr} Party Access Form for the secondary data to be collect from the teachers (their assignments etc. that are a part of the normal course of the class)
- Along with your 3rd Party Access submission, include a letter from the Superintendent that approves access to student assignments
- Remove from the protocol all 3rd party Access information and only include the attitudes survey that will be collect
- Remove from your protocol the training of the teachers as that is not a part of the study and is what the school is doing regardless of the study

The board then went into executive session deciding that as is the protocol could not be approved but upon resubmission, the protocol would be re-reviewed by the two primary reviewers over the summer.

Protocol 18-58 Dahlen, Lewis-Chiu, "Does Providing a Self-Advocacy Intervention Increase Student Grades in Middle School General Education Classes?" Primary Readers: Livingston & Wilson

At this meeting the board determined the conditions that must be met before approval of the protocol. They are listed below:

- In the protocol list the specific school site that data will be collecting from
- Submit a letter from the superintendent approving the collection of data at the school site
- Include RERC information in the consent forms listing that she is the person to contact about their rights as a participant
- More fully detail in the protocol how information security (the storing of data etc.) will occur and the disposition of consent forms

The board then went into executive session whereby McCleary moved to approve the protocol with conditions being met, Wilson seconded (7-0).

Protocol 18-60 Neri, Lewis-Chiu, "Effects of Self- Monitoring in Writing for Middle School Special Day Class Students". Primary Readers: Olson & Gamboa

At this meeting the board determined the conditions that must be met before approval of the protocol. They are listed below:

- Provide a checklist and rubric materials used in the study
- Include in the purpose section of the protocol that the district goal is improvement in the Special Ed Department
- More clearly describe the data collection process and data analysis
- Information security details must be included. Add this to the protocol and to the Consent Forms
- The Parent Consent Form and the Child Assent Form timeline language needs to be revised so that the Parent Consent Form comes first
- Include a letter of permission to conduct the research on the school site from the Superintendent
