Our Nursing Program's 50th anniversary celebration brought many of our first graduates home, including Margaret Freyberger Levy, who still carries with her the lessons she learned more than half a century ago: "We were taught that patients go to hospitals for nursing care. It was important to know your patients, not just their diagnosis."

We are proud of our milestones and believe in celebrating them. We are grateful to partners, both near and far, who collaborate with CSUB to uplift and advance our students and university. We look ahead to a future where our region realizes the promise of prosperity offered by a university education.

In the pages of this report, you will see there is ample reason to be optimistic about that future. And when CSUB thrives, so do the families in the communities we serve.

California State University, Bakersfield is committed to being a key driver of economic change, community development and social growth across the southern San Joaquin Valley and the nation. CSUB is Kern County's University, where Roadrunners use the transformative power of a university education to shape their personal futures and guide their families and communities onto a more prosperous path. Vernon B. Harper Jr. appointed interim president

In September 2023, California State University Interim Chancellor Jolene Koester announced the appointment of Vernon B. Harper Jr., Ph.D. as interim president of California State University, Bakersfield. The appointment was effective Dec. 31 following the retirement of President Lynnette Zelezny. Harper joined CSUB in 2016 as associate vice president for Academic Affairs and dean of academic programs. He was named provost and vice president for Academic Affairs in 2020. Over the course of his time at CSUB, Harper has led efforts to improve the university's graduation rates, helped launch the Department of Ethnic Studies, worked with local community colleges to streamline the transfer process, and introduced a public health bachelor's degree and a master of kinesiology degree. (Note: Harper was appointed as CSUB's sixth president in September 2024)





CSUB opens new Media Arts Center

CSUB's performing arts building was given new life last year as the result of a \$7.5 million renovation. The building has become the Media Arts Center, which opened last November. The facility includes an art exhibit space, darkroom, printmaking facilities, a digital media studio, computer lab, sound booths and faculty offices. The center serves as a dedicated home for the communications department and marks the first time the department has been housed on one location. This hub supports students in the department's three degree concentrations: journalism, public relations and digital media.

Nursing department celebrates 50th graduating class

CSUB's Department of Nursing welcomed back alumni from its first graduating class for a special anniversary fundraiser in April, celebrating the department's 50th graduating class. The event — themed "50 Years of Excellence: Reflecting on the Past and Envisioning the Future" — covered the program's early years, its success since then and exciting developments still to come. More than 200 alumni and family members attended the event, which helped raise around \$30,000 to support CSUB's nursing students.



CSUB receives \$1 million grant to launch doctorate of nursing

CSUB received a \$1 million grant from Kern Health Systems to establish a Doctor of Nursing Practice program at the university, part of a \$20 million package of support made by Kern County's largest health plan to expand access to health care, educate more primary-care professionals and narrow health equity gaps. The doctoral degree program replaces CSUB's Family Nurse Practitioner program. It will offer three tracks of study and is scheduled to welcome its first cohort of students in fall 2025.

Aera Energy provides \$2.5 million to support energy research

Aera Energy is providing \$2.5 million to CSUB to support its research into the effects of the energy transition on technology, the economy, the workforce and planetary resources. The investment funds an Executive Director for Energy Research position at the university's California Energy Research Center that will help focus and enrich the science produced by faculty and students. The executive director will also identify solutions that will forge a path to a new energy future.

Rangel received his Master of Business Administration with a perfect 4.0 GPA.

Despite a language barrier and other challenges, Santana excelled in her studies and achieved recognition as one of the outstanding graduates in the School of Social Sciences and Education after earning dual degrees in liberal studies and Spanish. She is currently pursuing a master's degree in counseling with a concentration in student affairs.

"That is my dream. There's nothing I would love more than to give back to the school that helped me achieve my goals," she said. "I've always believed knowledge is a very powerful tool and that if you make an effort to learn, you're going to go many places. We all get out of life whatever we are willing to put into it, and I decided I want to get the most out of life. I cannot believe how far I've come."

Emmanuel Ntui

Emmanuel Ntui quickly realized an engineering major wasn't a good fit for him when he transferred to the university from Bakersfield College in 2020. After a short-lived business endeavor, he found his passion for business and switched his major to accounting. From there, he became involved in the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program, which provides free tax services to individuals and families with low incomes. Outside of the classroom, Ntui has stayed active as a student assistant for the departments of student access and support, outreach services and athletics. Now, he is graduating from CSUB with his bachelor's degree in business administration with a concentration in accounting. Ari Wideman

Ari Wideman joined California State University,
Bakersfield in May 2024 as the new head coach of
the `Runner's Division I women's basketball team.
Her hiring marked a significant milestone for the
university, as she was the first Black woman to
be named as a head coach at CSUB and the first
woman to coach women's basketball in the
24-year history of the team.

"This is a dream come true to be able to come home to California and help lead this program to prominence. I want to be clear to everyone in Bakersfield, we are going to do great things here. I know that this is a special place waiting to erupt," Wideman said.

Liaosha Song, Ph.D.

Associate Professor of Geological Sciences Liaosha Song is researching two ways to use open vaults within the crust of the Earth to combat climate change: sequestering carbon dioxide in those vaults and storing hydrogen to use in renewable energy technologies. Song and his students are researching the chemical resistance and porosity of rock layers to determine the kind of rock that must exist to store these gases over the long term.

"Number one, the purpose is to mitigate one of the things that is impacting everybody's livelihood—that is the severe climate change over the past decades," Dr. Song said, mentioning extreme heat waves, floods, wildfires and storms. "And particularly for Bakersfield and Kern County, geologic storage also makes a lot of sense in terms of generating new jobs and fueling new power to the local industry."

FACULTY AND STAFF

Deborah Cours, Ph.D.

Deborah Cours joined CSUB in August of 2023 as the Dean of the School of Business and Public Administration. The former marketing professor and assistant vice president of undergraduate studies at California State University, Northridge received her bachelor's degree in psychology from the University of Iowa. She later received her Ph.D. in marketing at the University of California, Los Angeles.

"Exciting things are happening in the School of Business and Public Administration, and I'm pleased to help build upon the work completed to prepare our students for careers and lifelong learning, to partner in our community and to recognize the impactful scholarship and teaching our faculty provide and staff support."

Lupita Reyes-Garcia

Lupita Reyes-Garcia grew up in a farmworker family from Lost Hills and credits California State University, Bakersfield with sparking her belief that she could pursue higher education. After earning her master's degree at CSUB and launching a successful career as a social worker, she decided to give back to her alma mater by becoming a lecturer in social work.

"It's fun and exciting, but it's also daunting. I want to do a great job, but I'm still learning," she said. "I want to help other students just like myself – first-generation Mexican American and Latinx students. I carry that role of being a first-generation student and a CSUB graduate with so much honor and pride. I'm trying to instill that pride in my students as well."



Building a community through skateboarding

Veteran skateboarders and people who have just taken up the sport have come together to be a part of the growing Skater Society at CSUB. The club meets around once a week at a local skate park around Bakersfield to ride their boards, perfect tricks and – most importantly – build a community of people who can enjoy the sport together.

"We're trying to build a community where we can all have fun doing something that we all have a shared interest in and just have that socialization," said group president Marcila Diaz. "Skating is a great way to exercise and build your confidence."

Alumni Hall of Fame

The CSUB Alumni Association honored four storied alumni by inducting them in the CSUB Hall of Fame as the class of 2024. They included screenwriter and television producer Matt Harris, law enforcement trainer and retired assistant police chief Hajir Nuriddin, Kern County Public Health Director Brynn Carrigan and energy industry leader Ken Haney.

The four leaders were honored during a gala event in February 2024 in downtown Bakersfield, attended by family, friends and a legion of CSUB supporters.

MILLION RAISED IN 2023-24



The `Runners on the Rise campaign continued to pursue the goal of raising \$50 million to support the university and drive CSUB's tradition of academic excellence into a dynamic future.

Runners on the Rise was launched to support future leaders, foster academic excellence and build opportunity and proseperity in the community. Funds donated to the campaign will expand our region's access to higher education, fuel the success of our student athletes and strengthen our ability to enhance our campus' physical and educational environment.

Notable gifts provided during the 2023-24 fiscal year include:

- Aera Energy gave \$2.5 million to establish the Executive Director for Energy Research endowment.
- Kern Family Health Care gave \$1 million to expand the nursing program with more graduate studies.


ENDOWMENT

Philanthropic gifts for endowments are critical to ensure a permanent source of support for CSUB students. Endowments create an enduring legacy for donors while transforming the lives and futures of many bright, promising students, and the exceptional faculty who teach and mentor them.

Endowment fund asset allocation

The endowment pool is invested in accordance with the CSU Bakersfield Foundation's investment policy, which is designed with principal preservation and controlled growth as the main focus. With this long-term objective in mind, the portfolio is a diversified mix of investments across a broad range of asset classes, including equities (stocks), fixed income (bonds) and alternative investments. The assets are managed externally by professional investment managers hired by the CSU Bakersfield Foundation and are closely monitored by the foundation's finance committee.

The CSU Bakersfield Foundation's invested endowment balance as of June 30, 2024 is \$42.7 million, allocated as follows:
